These fees are collected at the school's accounts office on behalf of NZQA; they are for all internal and external credits. You will be advised by invoice as to how much you have to pay in NZQA fees. The last day for paying the fee at the school's accounts office is Monday, 3 September 2018. Candidates who fail to pay the fee by this date will have to pay the fee directly to NZQA before the 1 December 2018. If paid after this date a \$50.00 late fee will be charged for NCEA and Scholarship fees.

You are most welcome to make weekly or fortnightly payments through the school so that by the time the fees are due in September your daughter's qualification fees are paid. If you are interested in doing this, please contact Ms Brenda Green at the accounts office.



Social Studies:



RGHS and RBHS are the first schools in Aotearoa to participate in this initiative in conjunction with Unitec and the NZ Police. Students participated in adventure based learning activities with students from Rotorua Boys High School, as well as engaging with various members of the Rotorua Police. On the final day, students took part in a Solemn Undertaking ceremony, attended by Rotorua Area Commander, Inspector Anaru Pewhairangi and the Bay of Plenty Area Commander Superintendent Andy McGregor.

Since the noho marae, we have been working hard with our Police mentor, Senior Sergeant Nicky Cooney on our fitness. This includes pre testing for the 2.5km run, push ups and vertical jump. We have also been working on Module 1 of the UNITEC course as well as our first Unit Standard - Plan a Career Pathway. Students are finding out more about the Police and the role they play in our society.

On Saturday 17th February, we took part in a community event by ushering and car parking at Rotorua Lakeside. This was a successful event that enabled students to work on their communication skills when dealing with the public. It was also an eye opener, as students watched police dealing with a number of fights that broke out amongst youth. It is sad to see a small portion of youth letting down the community through their actions, however, our young women and men on the Police Course were fantastic role models throughout the event.

On Sunday 4th March, we will have our first trip away to the Royal NZ Police College in Wellington. Here we will be immersed in College life and will really get to taste what is on offer during a recruit's course. This is a hugely exciting challenge that we are excited to be taking up.



Year 9 Duathlon

The Science Faculty has registered every student onto a website that is aligned with the New Zealand Curriculum, which means every student can engage in self explorative research and learning. This site is www.





Opportunities:

Year 11 and 12 students have a great opportunity to experience science from another part of the world. This is through Wallacea - an organisation that enables high school students from around the world to work on environmental projects alongside experienced scientists. The results of the student's surveying contribute to published scientific reports while the experience gained through this work is held by the students forever. Year 11 and Year 12 students have the opportunity to form a group of committed, enthusiastic environmentalists and contribute alongside students from around the world to real conservation work in Indonesia.

This will require significant fundraising and time commitment by those involved. It will be an invaluable experience and would contribute favorably to any student CV.

Dr Roger Poland is a Wallacea representative and will outline the survey work in more detail during a presentation on the 19th March from 3.15-4.15 at RGHS.



Interested students have been provided a letter outlining this visit.

Year 11 FFL will be conducting survey work at Maketu Estuary with assistance from Environment Bay of Plenty. We are organising a Skype interview with a council employee regarding the restoration of the Maketu Estuary to provide deeper understanding of the wider issues relating to the area. The students will use these experiences to write a report on achievement standard 1.12 "The biological impact of an event in a New Zealand ecosystem".

Year 12 Biology will also be attending the survey site to gather data in order to complete achievement standard 2.6 "Investigate a pattern in an ecological community."

Welcome to the RGHS Wellness Centre of 2018. We aim to assist you, with your daughter's / ward's health and wellbeing. We offer a Nursing and Social Work/ Guidance service, alongside a Doctor's service twice a week, an Osteopath's service once a week, Drug and Alcohol counselling, Psychology and Youth Worker Clinics, and Social Worker Access, so please if you feel your daughter / ward requires any assistance , please contact the School Nurse Shirley Tickelpenny: <u>stickelpenny@rghs.school.nz</u> or phone the school and ask for extension 245.

We farewelled our 2016 -2017 Guidance Counsellor Tayla Sloane during the holidays and have Elizabeth Tai BA Social Sciences (Biculturalism) joining us for 2018. She is able to be contacted on <u>etai@rghs.school.nz</u> or phone the school and ask for extension 246.

All Year 9 students will undergo a Year 9 Assessment over the year, carried out by our visiting Nurse RN Aneta Stone Martin. This is based around vision, hearing and other aspects of Physical and Mental Health.

If your daughter / ward is new to the school and has a significant health issue, you will receive a call from us to see how we can assist her transition into the school and assist you with her condition. We also ask you as parents and caregivers of students with allergies, to make sure that the student brings any necessary medication to cover those allergies on Athletics Day, Swimming Sports Day and when they go on Trips Outside of school.

We also ask that if you daughter/ward is unwell and you ring in, please could you state the reason that they are sick ie: Cold, Diarrhoea and Vomiting etc. We have two students in the school that are immunocompromised and we need to be protective and mindful of this.

Students may self refer to any of the outside providers that come in to provide a service to our students. As long as they are able to understand what the treatment entails and have this outlined to them and a discussion around their treatment, they are able to consent themselves. We advise all students to discuss their treatment with parents or caregivers

THINGS YOUR TEENAGER NEEDS TO KNOW

The start of school can be an exciting and a frightening time for many teenagers. Here are five things you should tell your teenager.

- "Everyone else isn't doing it." There's a lot of talk about all the things teens claim to be doing drinking, using drugs, and having sex to name a few. The truth is, many of those claims aren't true. Teens who believe the popular kids are using drugs or having sex or staying out late are more likely to engage in those activities. The notion that 'everybody's doing it' can fuel poor choices in high school. Set the record straight and explain how some adolescents exaggerate and fib to be perceived as cool.
- 2. "I expect good grades from you." While it's not healthy to put too much pressure on your teens, it's important to set your expectations high enough that you'll encourage them to do their best. Reassure them that the workload will be manageable. Stay involved in your teen's education and take steps to ensure they motivated to get good grades.
- 3. "Kindness matters." Many teens believe their parents want them to be smart, more than they want them to be kind. Talk to your teen about healthy values. Make it clear that you want your teen to be successful, but explain that you want them to show kindness and compassion.
- 4. "You can earn freedom by showing you can make good choices." Explain they can have more independence but extra responsibility must be earned. They can show you when they are ready for more freedom by doing well with the independence they already have. If they can't arrive home on time, why would you allow them to stay out later? If they can't get their chores and homework done on time, why would you trust them with the car? Explain to your teens that their ability to gain more freedom depends on their behaviour.
- 5. "The decisions you make now can affect the rest of your life." Teens need to know that many of their decisions can impact them forever. Whether it's an inappropriate post on social media, or a risky decision that doesn't turn out well, there can be serious consequences for their choices. You can't be there to see what they're doing when they are at school or out with friends. Show confidence in them to think before they act and make healthy decisions, regardless of what others choose to do, but don't set them adrift. Be their staunch friend and supporter. (From Principals' Digest Volume24).



YEAR 13 - THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW THIS YEAR!

Check the school notices **every day** for notices that concern you such as University, Polytechnic and Outside Provider visits. Let your mates know if they miss a notice! The Careers Department will also use Facebook and school email addresses to keep you informed! You can make an appointment to see Mrs Oldman in the Careers Office to assist with your career planning.

The major universities visit twice a year. The first visit is about what is unique at their University. The second visit is really important as it is all about course planning. In some cases appointment times will be set up for you for these second round visits.

Student Loans & Allowances – a session will be held in the third term for students to register online with StudyLink – Work & Income, to register you for the student loan or allowance process. Put this APP on your phone now – NCEA PAL

Understand from your subject teachers exactly how many credits you need to achieve NCEA L3 and UE. Check if your credits are being gained in approved UE subjects.

Get into the habit of good time management, set aside homework time and stick to it! You will be amazed at the results!

Save some money this year, at least \$1,000 for you to have as an emergency fund and spending money for the first semester at a University or other Tertiary provider or even if you are starting work.

The school offers the GATEWAY programme for students to gain real time work experience in an area you are interested in pursuing when you leave school. All Gateway courses have credits attached and should be considered as a great way to gain top up credits if you need them whilst offering meaningful skills for the world of work and enhancing your CV! Being selected for a Gateway programme is a privilege and students are expected to keep up with subjects they miss when they are on a course.

Gateway Placements can be set up with many outside providers in the electrical, plumbing, building, hospitality, hairdressing, retail industries to name but a few.
