NCEA External Examinations:

The external examinations begin on Friday, 8 November 2019 and finish on Tuesday, 3 December 2019.

PB4L – (Positive Behaviour for Learning) TE AO Values:

Our school has created a culture that encourages positive behaviours and interactions between all. Our approach is to teach students the positive behaviours we expect to see, to remind them to use these positive behaviours and to acknowledge students when they show these positive behaviours.

We have championed the story of our Te Arawa ancestress TE AO Kapurangi and have woven her qualities into our PB4L expectations using the following acronym:

- **T** = The willingness to LEARN (RESILIENCE)
- E = Engaging to ACHIEVE (INTEGRITY)
- A = Always shows RESPECT (RESPECT)
- **O**= Offers to SERVE (EMPATHY)

Each term we promote a value, this term our value is A = Always Shows RESPECT (RESPECT). We use the PB4L restorative practice model of communication skills to build positive and respectful relationships across the whole school community. In a school that has at its heart, the learner and with academic achievement as our core business, Rotorua Girls' High weaves a leadership journey that also crafts future leaders. The opportunity to review is pivotal to our growth and I am excited by the role that whānau play as our learning partners and appreciate the voice that you have in shaping our next steps in the growing legacy of Rotorua Girls' High. For the duration of the term I will be seeking your voice as we review components of our Pastoral System and the Future Focused Learning experiences of students and their whānau. I welcome your feedback which will happen through a survey and hui with a range of randomly selected students from across the year levels and a group of parents. For those directly involved with our Future Focused Learning Pathway, there will be an opportunity to gather, celebrate and review what has been happening in these classes. Visual Arts

During week 4, we had another "Late Night" for senior students. We enjoyed this with Fashion girls and thank you to Miss Townsley who bought us some kai to keep us going! Digital Technology

Our Year 11 and 10 Digital Technology classes have started their Term Three unit of work - Robotics (Develop an electronics outcome). The goal of this unit is that students will become confident users of digital software and hardware by, planning, designing, creating and evaluating an electronic component as the final outcome for the assessment. As part of this experience a group of Digital Technology students attended an Aquabot build day at the Rotorua Library MakerSpace Workshop. They were exposed to electronics and coding. AquaBots are a remotely operated, tethered, underwater vehicles, designed and built by a group of students from a supplied kit. The varying levels of sophistication of the AquaBots ensures a broad appeal to students. They built the structure of the AquaBot as well as



solder the components, including the controller.

The purpose of the Aquabots build day is to expose students to real life experience. They will use these educational experiences to design, build and develop an Aquabot that will then be entered into the Rotorua Regional Aquabots Competition on Friday, 13 September 2019.

The majority of this group is made up of year 9 students who performed at the Regional Competition with Senior students as mentors for the group as well as performers and this is how we prepare our students for our Senior Haka group, Raukura.

Academic achievement remains at the forefront of all that we do and our Senior Reo classes and Rumaki class have been involved in the completion of tasks and exam preparation. Our Rumaki class bring a lens that demonstrates a Māori way of expressing their understanding of the world; 'Ko Māmā te tuara o tōku whānau, Ko Pāpā te poutokomanawa o tōku whānau, Ko au te toa o nga toa. Ko Amaia te pīwaiwaka o tōku whānau, ara ko pēpī hou te pōtiki o te whānau.'

Arahia, along with other Year 9's demonstrated their expertise at our Marautanga Year 9 Whānau Evening.

On Saturday 17th August, we travelled to Whakatane for Finals Day. This is where all the Bay Secondary School teams from different grades descend to play their finals. Our opposition for the final was Te Wharekura o Mauao, and although we had beaten them 65 - 5 in our regular round robin game during the season, we knew that they would be tough come finals day. Tough was an understatement as Mauao had a fire in their belly that saw them put us under enormous pressure, especially during the first half. The score at half time was 29-15 to RGHS which shows how fierce the game was. In the second half, RGHS extended the score line to 44 with three more tries to Mauao's 1 try.

In the final against JPC Senior A, we were up in the first quarter by four goals. We then trailed in the second quarter by 3, only to fight back and go into the fourth quarter 17 all. This set the game up to be a battle of everything these two teams had to win the fourth quarter, the game and the title of top school for 2019.

Janae Hayes our Y 9 girl had a great game off the line at WA driving hard to the ball and feeding the shooters well. Neven Northcroft played another strong game at WD and then shifted to WA where she worked hard on defence to help turn over some very good ball for us in the fourth quarter with Mya. Welcome to our fees-free update, bringing you answers to some of the most common questions.

If there's anything else you'd like to know, check out the FAQs on the <u>fees-free</u> <u>website</u>.

Fees-free

Fees-free is managed by the Tertiary Education Commission (TEC). Students can check if they can get fees-free study at <u>www.feesfree.govt.nz</u>.

Students who are New Zealanders and will finish school in 2019, may qualify for a year of fees-free tertiary study or two years of industry training in 2020.

Find out more about the <u>eligibility for fees-free</u>.

How to check if a student can get fees-free study

Students can go to <u>www.feesfree.govt.nz</u> and enter their National Student Number (NSN) to check. The majority of secondary school students should receive a 'yes - you are eligible' response.

If a student receives a 'we are not sure' response, they may need to provide further information to TEC. The fees-free website will let them know what they need to do.

How does a student apply for fees-free?

Students don't need to apply for fees-free.

Once the student has enrolled, TEC will check the student's details and if eligible, will pay the fees directly to the tertiary education provider or industry training organisation. They can pay up to a maximum of \$12,000 incl GST per year.

Does a student still need to apply to StudyLink? If a student only needs their fees paid they won't need to apply for a Student Loan unless their fees are over \$12,000.

If a student wants to apply for a Student Allowance or the living and courserelated costs parts of a Student Loan they'll still need to apply to StudyLink.
