# EDUCATION

We pride ourselves on our ability to cater for the academic needs of all students by offering flexibility within our curriculum. We offer creative and innovative courses alongside traditional subjects.

#### CURRICULUM

We offer the traditional English, Mathematics, Science, Physical Education and Social Science subjects, along with vibrant Technology and Arts options such as Dance, Drama, Fine Arts, and Music.

Students are encouraged to follow their passion and become lifelong learners.

#### JUNIOR SCHOOL

Junior students complete rotational subjections in year 9 and optional subjects in year 10, these are in addition to their core programme. These come from Creative Arts (Dance, Drama, Music), Marautanga (Te Ao Haka), Humanities (Business) English (Media Studies) Technology (Digital, Fashion, Food) and Visual Arts) Our program gives students the building blocks needed for them in their journey throughout life.

### SENIOR SCHOOL

Students can choose from an extensive range of courses, which have been carefully designed so that students have the right skills for their chosen future pathways. Credits in courses are towards National Certificate in Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 1, 2, and 3.

Students involved in this programme are identified during the enrolment process and during their time at Rotorua Girls' High School. They are mentored and coached to embrace academic, cultural, sporting, performing arts and leadership opportunities. The programme is designed to provide an enriched curriculum experience using EOTC opportunities and real life learning experiences.

### LITERACY

Literacy support is given to students through the Junior Multi-Literacy Programme which is supported by Ngāti Whakaue Education Endowment Trust and the Senior Mentoring Programme. These two strategies are used to enhance literacy achievement and to generate confidence in students.

#### ESOL

English for Speakers of other Languages (ESOL) classes are available to girls from non-English speaking backgrounds. Students can study towards ESOL unit standards at NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3.



### **EXPERIENCE** WELLBEING

Every student is respected, challenged and inspired. We care about students from all cultures and backgrounds and ensure each one leaves as an empowered young woman. The wellbeing of all students is paramount here at Rotorua Girls' High School.

At our school you will find a strong community feel, including:

### **PASTORAL CARE**

We believe that you learn best when you feel valued and are actively engaged in your learning. Positive relationships between teachers, students and whānau are essential for learners to thrive. Teachers encourage you to fully participate in class so you can get the most out of your learning experience.

### MENTORING

Learning dialogues where you can share your learning with your family. Individual counselling for personal issues is available at all times. Careers advice is available at all times. Families are always welcome in the school.

#### WELLNESS CENTRE

Our onsite wellness centre offers students confidential advice from the centre coordinator, school nurse, guidance counsellor, and visiting GPs. They also have access to the mobile dental clinic, drug and alcohol counsellors, adolescent health nurse, psychologist, and youth worker.

### ACADEMIC REVIEW

Students, whānau, and teachers will meet throughout the year to discuss academic achievement, attendance, and career pathways.

### DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR DAME JANE HARDING

Jane Harding attended Rotorua Girls' High School between 1969-1972. Studying both at Auckland University and at Oxford, Jane has become a distinguished professor and is currently teaching Neonatology at Auckland University. She was awarded the Rhodes Scholarship in 1978. In the 2020 Queen's Birthday Honours, Jane was promoted to Dame Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit.

### AMANDA LANDERS-MURPHY

Amanda Landers-Murphy was a student at RGHS from 2005-2008. Amanda was part of the RGHS Institute of Sport which allowed her to focus on her Squash. While at school, Amanda also played Tennis and Table Tennis. Amanda has been a Commonwealth Games Gold Medallist twice in 2018 Gold Coast and 2022 Birmingham. She was the World Doubles Champion in 2016 and 2017.

### **LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES**

Elected positions held by our Year 13 students include: Head Girl, Deputy Head Girl, Academic Leaders, Sports Leaders, Arts Leaders and Cultural Leaders. We have leadership opportunities for House Leaders, CATCH and BOT representatives.

Student Council, Pasifika Fono, Environmental and Kahui Rangatahi are committees that meet regularly to share students' opinions on school matters. ### Why go to a girls' school?

A girls' school creates a culture of strong academic achievement where they are confident and assertive learners. They feel free to compete and take risks and can create outstanding opportunities that open doors to the world beyond school.

### What subjects can I take?

In the Junior school you will have compulsory English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, Te Reo Maori and PE/Health. You will also get to experience Technology, Business and the Creative Arts. In the Senior school there is a plethora of subjects you can choose from.

### What sports can I play?

Rotorua Girls' High School offers a huge range of sports including Rugby, Waka Ama, Netball, Basketball, Squash, Outdoor Bowls, Touch Rugby, Badminton, Hockey, Table Tennis, and many more.

### What cultural activities can I join?

We offers a wide range of cultural activities. These include Production, Kapa Haka, Dance Crews, Pasifika Group, Choir, Art Clubs, Band and Community Service Groups.

### How big is this school?

We have over 650 students along with over 40 fulltime and part-time staff. Our class sizes are approximately 20-25 students, which creates excellent opportunities for student learning.

### Is there a different summer and winter uniform?

The basis of the uniform is the same all year round - the difference is the shoe choice. In summer terms (Terms 1 and 4) students wear black Roman sandals and in the winter terms (Terms 2 and 3) students wear plain black shoes with black stockings or short black socks.

### Do you have accomodation?
